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

The Role of the Briar in The Dambusters Raid



Further to the letter from Major Bedd, DFC, MM, RFC (Retd.) (B&B Vol. 2 Iss. 1), the editorial team at B&B has been extensively researching the role of the briar in Bomber Command. Our research, unsurprisingly, has found that the humble briar did indeed play a significant role in Bomber Command. However, the role was so significant, that due to space considerations we opted to concentrate on the role of the briar in one of the most famous bombing missions of WWII; namely the famous 'Dambusters Raid', or more correctly (before anyone writes in in smoky indignation) 'Operation Chastise'. We hope KPC members and readers alike will learn something new about how pipes helped our Chaps prevail in this story of daring-do...

Background to the Dambusters raid

On the night of 16/17th May 1943 the secret 617 Squadron formed from elite pilots set off from RAF Scampton on an audacious bombing raid to strike at the industrial heartland of western Germany and attack the great dams of the Ruhr valley: the Möhne, Eder and Sorpe. The mission and the weapon which made it possible were devised by the inventor and aircraft designer Barnes Wallis. Prior to inventing the 'bouncing-bomb' (more correctly it was actually classified as a 'mine') Wallis was famed for inventing the Wellington, thereby enabling the country Chap to have dry feet whatever the weather.

A total of 19 Avro Lancaster bombers from 617 Squadron flew the mission. The 'Lancs' had been extensively modified to carry a single 4 ton spinning (at 500rpm) bomb, codenamed 'Upkeep'. To breach the dam, each bomb had to be dropped at a precise distance (425 yards), speed (240mph) and height (60ft) to enable it to bounce across the water, sink at the base of the dam and then detonate at depth, thereby using the shockwave focused by the water to crack the dams. 617 Squadron was led by the indomitable Wing Commander Guy Gibson – a famous brother of the briar who, when asked how he kept his nerve under fire was quoted as saying "*It's down to about 50% briar and about 50% leaf*". The Chaps of 617 Squadron were required to fly at extremely low level, not only to drop their bouncing-bombs but to keep below enemy radar enroute over the Netherlands making it one of the most daring and dangerous missions of WWII.

Reconnaissance images depicting the raids dramatic outcome, coupled with the courage, skill and originality of the mission led to 617 Squadron becoming famously known as 'The Dambusters' and their motto was: "Après le déluge, le bruyère" ("After the flood, the briar") – see the 617 Squadron crest opposite.

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"To attack these targets successfully it is necessary to inject the largest possible charge to the greatest possible depth in the medium (earth or water) that surrounds or is in contact with the target." – Dr Barnes Wallis, CBE, FRS & designer of the 'bouncing-bomb'.

The Role of the Briar in The Dambusters Raid cont:

Special equipment required

Due to the extremely low level required for successful releasing of the spinning <u>bouncing-bombs</u>, conventional bombsights of the day were useless. Therefore, this required the designing of completely new device to allow accurate bomb release when the Lanc was at exactly 60ft above the water. The ingenious answer was a special hand held bombsight made of wood (see photo), of amazing simplicity. It was this simplicity of the design that would enable the pipe smokers of 617 Squadron (*of course just about all RAF Chaps were in the brotherhood of the briar in those days, Ed.*) to save the day and complete their mission, as will be revealed.

The radical bombsight was an adjustable 'Y' shaped wooden device with pins in the end of the 'Y', a handle and an eyepiece for aiming. On the attack run the bombardier simply had to look through the eyepiece at the pins and when the pins were exactly lined up with the towers on the dams he released the bouncing-bomb.

Of course the Lancs had to be at 60ft when the bouncingbomb was dropped so conventional altimeters were also of no use. Therefore a simple system of two angled spotlights was employed under the aircraft and when they converged on the reflective surface of the water (*using the pipethagoras theorem, Ed.*) the plane was at 60ft. Then the pilot had to keep the speed at 240mph at 60ft on the approach to the dam- no easy task under fire and when wearing an oxygen mask it was also impossible to have a nerve-steadying bowl. *The angled spotlights allowed the Lancs to be at exactly 60ft above the water to release their bouncing- bombs*

On the flight out the three waves of 617 Squadron encountered some heavy flak and as a result several of the special bombsights were damaged. It is also a little known fact that two crews actually *forgot* their bombsights. Before the formations reached the dams alternative arrangements had to be made very quickly, otherwise the bouncing-bombs obviously could not be aimed accurately and the mission would be a disaster.

The research team at Briar & Bothies has uncovered top secret papers that revealed how our Chaps overcame the lack of the wooden bombsights, thereby adding more detail to an already legendary mission.

For a decision that would later gain him the Victoria Cross, Wing Co. Guy Gibson ordered the crews who had problems or missing bombsights to make replacements using their briars, pipe tools and pipe cleaners. It was a master-stroke that saved the day, allowing our Chaps to successfully complete the mission and destroy the Möhne and Eder dams.

The improvised briar-bombsight was simple: two straight briars formed the 'Y' with their bowls acting as the aiming pins, a pipe tool was deployed as the aiming eyepiece and a third straight briar was the handle. The whole lot was held together using pipe cleaners. Once again some ground-breaking research by the team at B&B has revealed how important the sturdy briar was for RAF missions during WWII!


Recreation of the briar-bombsight

Unfortunately the returning crews dismantled their briar-bombsights during their return to RAF Scampton for a welldeserved smoke, so no original examples have remained. Somewhat saddened by this fact the editorial team at B&B has responded in fine fashion and has actually re-created an example briar-bombsight in time to commemorate the 70th anniversary of The Dambusters raid in May this year. The B&B briar-bombsight even includes a computer simulation showing a highly realistic representation of the dam attack! We think readers will agree that with the aid of modern technology and a few sturdy briars deployed by the team at B&B, the ingenuity and resourcefulness of the likes of Gibson has been brought to life. 





If a Chap pays attention to maintaining high levels of all of the above then he should be a happy Chappy all of the time. Splendid what!










TOBACCO & PIPE OF THE MONTH

Holger Danske 'Royal Navy Flake'



From the manufacturer:


Exquisite Virginia tobaccos, slowly ripened in calm, rounded off with a very soft fruit aromatic touch. A cool burning blend with natural sweetness.

Review:

The tin note is very fruity, almost floral. The tin is small at 6.5cm x 8.5cm, so correspondingly the flakes are smaller than usual. This tobacco is beautifully packed in an inner bag sealed with a foil gold leaf. The flake is a very golden colour with a dry crumbly texture (much drier than say SG Navy Flake) that makes packing your bowl very simple. It is a flavoursome smoke and stays lit easily with its subtle but fruity taste with you all the way down the bowl. The room note is definitely pleasing and likely to attract the lady sailors out there.

The tobacco named after the famous battle the perfect fill for any Zulu!



The Zulu combines the canted bowl of the Dublin with a 1/8 bent stem. The shape is sometimes referred to as a Woodstock, (*but we'll have none of that hippy nonsense here, Ed.*) Yacht, or Yachtsman. The gentle bend makes the pipe more comfortable to hold in the teeth than a straight pipe.

Although the Zulu pipe did not feature, it was of course named after the magnificent 1964 film 'Zulu' starring Michael Caine as the quintessential stiff-upper lipped Lieutenant Gonville Bromhead who led British troops at the famous battle of Borkum Riff (see below).

With a heritage like that any Chap gripping a Zulu between gritted teeth instantly becomes a battle-hardened warrior!




